Human Trafficking

The elimination of human trafficking is a priority issue for the Catholic Church. Because every life is a gift from God and is sacred, it deserves to be protected and nurtured. We each have a responsibility to fight against the violation and degradation of our brothers and sisters. The Vatican released a set of guidelines, or [pastoral orientations](#) to help the Catholic community eradicate trafficking.

The Catechism of the Church forbids acts that cause the enslavement of humans. During the Second Vatican Council in 1965, the Church further stated "slavery, prostitution, the selling of women, and children, and disgraceful working conditions where people are treated as mere tools for profits rather than free and responsible persons are infamies and supreme dishonor to the creator." (Gaudium et Spes, 1965).


In 2014, Pope Francis stated during his Declaration on the International Day for the Abolition of Slavery: "[M]odern slavery, in terms of human trafficking, forced labor and prostitution, and organ trafficking, is a crime against humanity. Its victims are from all walks of life but are most frequently among the poorest and most vulnerable of our brothers and sisters."

Men and women religious play an integral part in the battle against human trafficking. In 2001, 800 women leaders of the International Union of Superiors General (UISG) passed a resolution dedicating one million members "to work in solidarity with one another within our own religious communities and in the countries in which we are located to address insistently at every level the abuse and sexual exploitation of women and children..."

The U.S. Catholic Sisters Against Human Trafficking is the domestic response to this call.





Indicators of Human Trafficking *Let's not Ignore the Signs*

Signs of being controlled:

- Has no form of formal identification, such as a passport, license, state ID
- Unable to leave job or residence
- Has limited contact with family and friends
- Not in control of their own finances
- Is under 18 and provides commercial sex acts
- At any age unwillingly provides commercial sex acts
- Is afraid of law enforcement or receiving help
- In a relationship with someone who is dominating
- Never is alone and/or always has someone translating or answering questions on their behalf

Signs of trauma:

- Inconsistent details when telling their story
- Seems anxious, fearful or paranoid; avoids eye contact
- Tearfulness or signs of depression
- Unexplained bruises or cuts or other signs of physical abuse
- Is evasive or unable to answer questions about where they live




Identifying and Assisting Victims of Human Trafficking

As a service provider, you may have an opportunity to identify and assist a victim of human trafficking. These are some red flags:

- 🚩 Seems anxious, fearful or paranoid. Avoids eye contact.
- 🚩 Tearfulness or signs of depression.
- 🚩 Unexplained bruises or cuts or other signs of physical abuse.
- 🚩 Appears to be in a relationship with someone who is dominating.
- 🚩 Never is alone and/or always has someone translating or answering questions on their behalf.
- 🚩 Not in control of their own finances.
- 🚩 Presents with secrecy or unable to answer questions about where they live.
- 🚩 Inconsistent details when telling their story.
- 🚩 Has no identification such as a license, passport or other ID documents.
- 🚩 Inability to leave their job or residence. Says they cannot schedule appointments.
- 🚩 Being a recent arrival to the United States and does not speak English.
- 🚩 Is under 18 and providing commercial sex acts. Or at any age unwillingly providing commercial sex acts.
- 🚩 Is afraid of law enforcement or receiving help from an outside entity.

If you can find an opportunity to get them alone, ask them the following screening questions:

- 🗨️ Can you leave your job or house when you want?
- 🗨️ Where did you get those bruises or is anyone hurting you?
- 🗨️ Do you get paid for your employment? Is it fair? How many hours do you work?
- 🗨️ (If foreign national) How did you get to the U.S. and is it what you expected? Are you being forced to do anything you don't want to do?
- 🗨️ Are you or your family being threatened?
- 🗨️ Do you live with or near your employer? Does your employer provide you housing? Are there locks on doors or windows from outside?
- 🗨️ Do you owe debt to anyone?

If you suspect they are a victim of human trafficking, take the following actions:

- 🕒 Ask the person if you can help them find a safe place to go immediately.
- 🕒 If they need time, create an action plan with them to get to a safe place when they are ready.
- 📞 Call and make a report to the human trafficking hotline at 1.888.3737.888. The hotline has language capabilities, so any individual can call directly if they choose.
- 🗨️ If you need more guidance, you can call and talk through the case with USCCB Anti-trafficking program staff at 202.541.3357.

Human Trafficking in the United States

Each year, as many as 17,000 vulnerable men, women and children are trafficked across our borders and then forced into slavery. Many are fleeing terrible situations in their home countries, and come to the United States to find a better life. Unfortunately, the nightmare often begins when they reach our shores.

What we do...For over a decade, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has been a national leader in advocacy and education to eradicate sex and labor trafficking. For six years, USCCB and our partners provided intensive case management services to victims of human trafficking. Currently, the agency is concentrating on training and technical assistance so that victims can be identified, brought into safety, and ultimately we can help eradicate the horrible crime of modern day slavery.

1. **Be observant.** Identify victims in your community and respond appropriately.

INTRODUCCIÓN Y SALUDOS



Todo menor de edad que sea inducido a realizar actos sexuales comerciales es víctima de la trata de personas. Los menores de edad que son obligados a trabajar contra su voluntad (por ejemplo, en trabajo agrícola, servicio doméstico o fábricas) son víctimas de la trata de personas.

Existen varios servicios disponibles para las víctimas menores de edad, lo que incluye viviendas seguras, atención médica, inmigración, alimentos, ingresos, empleo, asistencia legal e interpretación. Pero, primero, es necesario identificar a las víctimas.



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¿Qué es la trata de personas?



Capacitación: Aspectos básicos de la trata de personas

¿Qué es la trata de personas?

La trata de personas es la esclavitud moderna, e involucra el uso de fuerza, fraude o coacción para obtener algún tipo de trabajo o acto sexual con fines de lucro. En todo el mundo, hay miles de hombres, mujeres y niños víctimas de trabajos forzados y de la industria de la prostitución. Muchas de estas víctimas dejan sus hogares atraídas por promesas falsas de trabajos bien pagados; en cambio, mediante la fuerza o coacción, deben someterse a la prostitución, a la servidumbre doméstica o a otros tipos de trabajos forzados. Las víctimas se encuentran en industrias legítimas e ilegítimas, incluidos talleres de explotación obrera, salones de masajes, campos de cultivos, restaurantes, hoteles y servicio doméstico.

La trata de personas es distinta del tráfico humano. La trata de personas se basa en la explotación del ser humano, y no requiere cruces fronterizos ni ningún tipo de transportación.

¿Quiénes son las víctimas? ¿Quiénes están en peligro?

Las víctimas de la trata de personas pueden ser de cualquier edad, raza, género o nacionalidad. Pueden ser hombres o mujeres, jóvenes o ancianos, estadounidenses o extranjeros, con o sin situación migratoria legal.

Los tratantes se aprovechan de víctimas con escasa o ninguna red de protección social. Buscan a personas vulnerables debido a su situación migratoria ilegal, dominio deficiente del inglés, y quienes podrían estar en condiciones vulnerables debido a problemas económicos, inestabilidad política, desastres naturales, o demás causas.

Los indicadores mencionados son tan solo algunas señales que podrían advertirle acerca de una posible situación de trata de personas. Sin embargo, no existe un indicador en particular que constituya prueba irrefutable de la trata. Si sospecha que alguien podría ser víctima de trata de personas, por favor, llame a la línea para informantes de la Oficina de Investigaciones de Seguridad Nacional del Servicio de Inmigración y Control de Aduanas de Estados Unidos (*Immigration and Customs Enforcement [ICE] Homeland Security Investigations [HSI]*) al 1-866-347-2423. También puede realizar denuncias en línea en el sitio web www.ice.gov/tips.

Para comunicarse con una organización no gubernamental para obtener información y ayuda en forma confidencial las 24 horas, llame al Centro Nacional de Recursos contra la Trata de Personas (*National Human Trafficking Resource Center*) al 1-888-3737-888.

¿Cómo puedo identificar la trata de personas?

Por lo general, la trata de personas está “oculta a simple vista”. Hay ciertas señales o indicadores que pueden alertarlo sobre situaciones de trata. Reconocer estas señales es el primer paso para identificar a las víctimas.

Algunas señales que podrían indicar situaciones de víctimas potenciales incluyen:

Conducta o estado físico:

- ¿La víctima muestra signos de temor, ansiedad, depresión, sumisión, tensión, o nerviosismo/paranoia?
- ¿La víctima deja que otra persona hable por ella?
- ¿La víctima muestra señales de abuso físico o sexual, restricciones físicas, confinamiento o tortura?
- ¿La víctima ha sido lesionada o privada de alimento, agua, sueño, atención médica o demás necesidades básicas?
- ¿La víctima tiene muy pocos bienes materiales o ninguno?

Conducta social:

- ¿La víctima puede contactarse libremente con amigos o familiares?
- ¿La víctima tiene permitido socializar o asistir a servicios religiosos?
- ¿La víctima tiene libertad de movimiento?
- ¿La víctima o su familia ha recibido amenazas de daño si la víctima intenta escapar?

Condiciones laborales y situación migratoria:

- ¿La víctima trabaja jornadas excesivamente largas o en horarios inusuales?
- ¿La víctima es una persona joven involucrada en el comercio sexual?
- ¿La víctima fue reclutada para un propósito y forzada a realizar otra labor?
- ¿El salario de la víctima es retenido para saldar una deuda de tráfico ilícito? (El hecho en sí de saldar una deuda por tráfico ilícito no se considera trata de personas.)
- ¿La víctima ha sido obligada a realizar actos sexuales?
- ¿La víctima ha sido amenazada con deportación o denuncia a las autoridades? ¿La víctima tiene en su poder los documentos de identificación personal y de viaje? Si no fuera así, ¿quién los tiene?

Víctimas menores de edad:

- ¿La víctima es una persona joven involucrada en el comercio sexual?

Eventually she was sold to an Italian diplomat and taken to Italy, where she was later brought to freedom through the help of the Canossian Daughters of Charity, Josephine later became a Canossian Sister. She dedicated her life to sharing her testament of deliverance from slavery and comforting the poor and suffering until her death in 1947. In her honor, we recognize February 8th as a Day of Prayer for victims of human trafficking.

St. Josephine Bakhita is now a patron saint to the many that still suffer today with chains of exploitation, abuse and human trafficking.

Christmas and Alternative Gift Giving

The Christmas season has become a time of frenzied shopping and spending fueled by excessive commercialism. We want to have it all! But this consumerist lifestyle seems at odds with the true meaning of Christmas, so when we buy gifts, are we doing the right thing and what is the environmental and social impact?

As Catholics, we are called to celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas Day, not material things. Yet our consumption during this season creates over 25 million extra tons of trash. When we produce unmanageable waste, we are impacting the most vulnerable on earth: the poor communities and those suffering injustices. Many who cannot afford clean water or sanitation are impacted, and indigenous lands are lost to development and progress. Pope Francis writes “The emptier a person’s heart is, the more he or she needs things to buy, own, and consume,” in his encyclical: *Laudato Si’: On Care of Our Common Home*. His words urging us to better understand how our daily actions impact the world around us, and to open our eyes to how our excessive consumption burdens Earth, our air, water, and life within it. It may take courage to implement this realization in a meaningful way, but below are some ways to honor the birth of Christ and consider others and the earth during this special season.

Charity Gift Catalogs Many charities offer gift choices such as funding a child’s education or buying livestock for a family. A Fort Mill-based organization called Give & Teach helps support families in Guatemala by building schools and homes:

Buy Fair Trade Sadly, forced labor conditions, including child labor, may exist in the supply chains of many of the products that we buy. In the race to produce goods cheaply and quickly, companies may sacrifice ethical and environmental measures. Fair Trade represents an employment or trade relationship based on the treatment of workers, artisans and farmers, providing fair wages, safer working conditions and consideration of the environment. Read product labels to help guide you in seeking ethically sourced products that support the people and the environment.

Catholic Relief Services & Fair Trade

About 500 Catholic organizations host sales of handicrafts from around the world through Catholic Relief Services (CRS) and its partner, SEKRV, a nonprofit fair trade organization benefiting impoverished craftsman around the world by helping them out of poverty by providing sustainable trade opportunities. Many rescued victims of trafficking must find work and build skills to survive and to avoid falling back into the hands of abuse and forced labor. They often do this by selling handcrafted goods. Adventure Gifts Give an experience that will offer exposure to nature, science or family time. Horseback riding lessons, flight lessons, museum or park membership, zip-lining and music lessons can be memory-making gifts!

Consumable Gifts Provide a homemade dish or treat wrapped in a reusable container. Avoid plastic containers and packaging and instead wrap in a reusable tea towel and top with a twig of evergreen or for an organic touch. Natural elements are attractive and naturally biodegradable and can be found on our daily walks through nature or in our back yard. Take only what you need, and be aware not to disturb natural habitats or harm endangered species.

Eco-friendly Gifts As you shop year-round, avoid single-use items, avoid plastic, shop local, buy package-free and choose organically made, ethically sourced products. For deliveries, make sure the shipping material is recyclable and eco-friendly.


We have the power to support greater causes through our purchases. So, live a bit more simply, consume to aid others and the environment, and give gifts that make a difference.

Online Child Exploitation

- Discuss internet safety with children of all ages when they engage in online activity.
- Review and approve games and apps before they are downloaded.
- Make sure privacy settings are set to the strictest level possible for online gaming systems and electronic devices.
- Monitor your children's use of the Internet; keep electronic devices in an open, common room of the house.
- Check your children's profiles and what they post online.
- Explain to your children that images posted online will be permanently on the Internet.
- Make sure children know that anyone who asks a child to engage in sexually explicit activity online should be reported to a parent, guardian, or other trusted adult and law enforcement.
- Remember that victims should not be afraid to tell law enforcement if they are being sexually exploited. It is not a crime for a child to send sexually explicit images to someone if they are compelled or coerced to do so.

Child Abuse Awareness

- Teach your children about body safety and boundaries.
- Encourage your children to have open communication with you.
- Be mindful of who is watching your child for childcare/babysitting, playdates and overnight visits.
- If your child discloses abuse, immediately contact local law enforcement for assistance.
- Children experiencing hands-on abuse may exhibit withdrawn behavior, angry outbursts, anxiety, depression, not wanting to be left alone with a specific individual, non-age appropriate sexual knowledge, and an increase in nightmares.

Victim Reporting

Reporting suspected sexual exploitation can help minimize or stop further victimization, as well as lead to the identification and rescue of other possible victims. If you believe you are—or someone you know is—the victim of child sexual exploitation:

- Contact your local law enforcement agency.






July 30 - World Day Against Trafficking

What can we as Catholics do?

Shop with businesses that are certified 'Fair trade' or uphold ethical standards that secure the rights of workers, reduces poverty, promotes sustainable development and cares for the community's environment. When consumers choose ethically sourced products, they create demand for more products that do not involve child labor and instead support the workers while providing safe and sustainable employment. When you shop for ethically produced products and goods, you help create that sustainability for workers.

These are things we want to consider as conscientious consumers.


